

# Screening Toolkit

This toolkit is designed to support communities, organizations, businesses—anyone!—in hosting a screening and discussion of the short documentary, Take Care.

### Why host an event?

Take Care is intended to spark discussion and spur action to solve our child care crisis. Through the voices and stories of North Carolinian families, child care teachers, businesses, and community leaders, Take Care provides a firsthand account of how this crisis is impacting all of us, how communities are trying to address the crisis, and what is at stake if we don't create lasting solutions.

While child care is foundational to our state and country's wellbeing, it is built on a flawed and unsustainable funding model. Parents cannot afford to pay more. Providers and teachers can't earn enough to make a living. Government and private investment are woefully inadequate. As a result, teachers cannot afford to stay in the profession and are leaving for jobs at convenience stores and gas stations that pay more, child care classrooms struggle to stay open, and employers are losing workers.

This hurts everyone—children, families, child care teachers and providers, businesses, and our economy. The end of emergency funding to help stabilize child care has further worsened the crisis.

Our nation relies on quality child care to support children's healthy development and learning, allow parents to work, and keep businesses running. Yet, child care is in crisis—one that has been decades in the making and was exacerbated by the pandemic.

# **Event Planning Checklist**

#### Several weeks prior to the event:

- Define your objectives, what you want to achieve with the event
- Identify your audience
- Confirm date that will work best for your audience
- Choose and confirm location
- Confirm parking instructions
- Confirm AV equipment
- Develop invitation list
- Send Save the Date (see template)
- Determine if you will invite press

#### Four weeks prior to the event:

- Send invitation (see template)
- Manage RSVPs
- Arrange catering (if needed)

#### One to two weeks prior to the event:

- Manage RSVPs
- Call people that have not RSVP'd
- Gather supplies
- Purchase drinks and snacks
- Draft media alert (if inviting press, see template)

#### One week prior to the event:

- Confirm catering
- Prepare and print handouts
- Create and print name tags
- Print directional signage if needed

#### Three days prior to event

Send media alert and call reporters (if inviting press)

#### Day of event:

- Have laptop
- Assign someone to take notes
- Set tables
- Set up AV
- Set up directional signage if needed
- Check people in to track attendance

#### Day after event:

- Send press release (see template)
- Send thank you email to attendees, including summary of discussion
- Publish blog, social media content, letter to the editor, or other medium to share



### **Promotional Resources**

In addition to the resources shared in this guide, the following resources are available on the website:

- Movie Poster/Flyer: Use the poster to promote the documentary and as signage at your event.
- <u>One-Page Fact Sheet</u>: Use the fact sheet to engage partners, raise funds to support your event, share with attendees, and encourage others to share the documentary with their networks.
- Social Media Graphics: Use the graphics to promote Take Care in your community. If your event is open to the public, you can write your post to promote it.

- How can we work together to create lasting solutions so that families can find afford quality child care, teachers stay in the profession, child care programs are sustainable, employers have the workforce they need, and our community thrives?

Teachers cannot afford to stay in the profession. They earn an average of \$14 per hour—not enough to meet basic needs for housing, food, health care, and other necessities. They are leaving for jobs at convenience stores and gas stations that pay more. As a result, child care programs are either closing or are under-enrolled because they cannot hire teachers. Employers are feeling the impact. Research by the NC Chamber Foundation shows that parents of young children in North Carolina are leaving the workforce (26%), refusing job opportunities, promotions or new jobs (37%), missing work (60%), and not pursuing job training or continuing education (32%). This costs this state \$1.36 billion in lost tax revenue and employers \$4.48 billion.
